

Directions: The map above shows the Comber area and it includes the major highways (401, 77, 8 and 46) that are in the area of the observatory.

The most direct route from Windsor is "highlighted" on the map which is to take 401 East to Highway 77 South to South Middle Road. While on South Middle Road you go about 1 kilometer and just after the barely discernable point where Concession 9 joins it you will find the observatory site on the South side of the road.

If you hit the Rochester Townline Road (i.e. you come to a stop sign and have to turn left or right) you have gone too far.

The minutes from the April meeting were read and accepted following a motion by Tina Chichkan seconded by Al Des Rosiers. Steve welcomed new members and guests.

Correspondence Secretary: Joady Ulrich

Joady brought a copy of the agenda for the Annual General Assembly in Ottawa in June.

Treasurer: Ken Garber

Ken reported our bank account balance is currently \$6443.32. There are 105 paid up members. Ken announced there would be additional prizes in the 50-50 draw at coffee break.

Librarian: Rick Marion

On the desk this evening are two boxes of astronomy books, free for the taking. They had been declared surplus from the Windsor/Essex Library system.

Rick has cataloged about 50% of the books at the observatory. The finished catalog will be placed on the web for members to

peruse and borrow books.

Newsletter Editor: Ken Garber

For the Aurora, Ken would like articles from members. Other Centres' newsletters are on the desk for the taking. Steve mentioned the Amherstburg telescope listed in the last newsletter has been sold.

Director of Public Education: Randy Groundwater

On Astronomy Day about 25 persons came to the observatory for the evening. Coincidentally it was also our Open House Night.

Pierre Boulos is planning to take a group of Physics students from the University of Windsor to the observatory this month.

Director of Public Relations: Peter Bondy

Earth Day on April 23rd at Ojibway Park was a success with about 2000 people attending. Our booth featured both Astronomy and Light Pollution Reduction displays.

Light Pollution Abatement: Dan Taylor

Point Pelee National Park officially became a "Dark Sky Site" on May 12th. At the Festival of Birds annual fund raising dinner the first RASC Light Pollution Abatement award was presented to park officials by Steve Mastellotto. This event is highly significant and is hoped to lead to further dark sky sites. It is a wonderful example of progress to return the stars to our night skies.

Our LPA display was also set up at the event and ably manned by Peter Bondy.

Dan displayed a very well made FCO barnyard light fixture not yet available in Canada for lack of bilingual labeling. Contact Northern Marketing for further information.

He reminded members to call 311 in Windsor to report violations of the new LPA measures. In Windsor the new water pollution plant STILL has the wrong lighting fixtures. The Earth Tech people doing the upgrade plans for highway 3 have given only poor responses to suggestions for FCO fixture inclusions in their design work.

Tim Bennett told us the new truck stop on highway 3 produces far too much light pollution. In a word, their lighting is "horrible".

National Council Representative: Tim Bennett

Tim will represent us in the Annual General Assembly May 18-22 in Ottawa.

The key items on the agenda follow:

- Centres with 200 or greater members during the year would have two representatives.
- -A life membership fee increase of \$1000 to \$2100 total.
- -A general membership fee increase of \$4 annually without the usual share sent to local Centres.

Observatory Director: Peter Bondy

For the moment the telescope at observatory is not functional via some sort of software glitch. Steve and Randy Groundwater will investigate.

The next open house date is Saturday June 3 at 9:45 p.m.

A date will be set for a general cleanup. In the meantime, Hornet control will be started early.

Evening Sky Maps for May were distributed. Steve then showed excellent shots of comet Schwassmann-Wachmann, breaking into numerous components, spread out by virtue of the jet action from dust and gasses blowing off the fractured surfaces. They trail across 6 degrees of sky.

More shots of the newly discovered and growing red spot on Jupiter make it an interesting target from our observatory.

Mars, Saturn and the Beehive nebula will all be very close on our picnic night.

Steve highlighted some Messier objects of interest in May and also did a review of the constellations most visible at this time.

More Kuiper belt objects are being found. Steve showed shots of one, larger than Pluto and sporting two moons. It is 2003EL61. It is theorized to have an icy surface.

Coffee Break and 50/50 Draw:

Ken Garber presented three additional prizes, Key ring red LED lights. The lucky winners were Jim Parent, Pierre Boulos and Randy Groundwater.

Steve Pellarin asked for assistance from members with telescopes able help to with group of about 125 Boy Scouts at Heritage Village on Friday May 19th. Randy had organized the event but was unable to handle it due to his work schedule.

Main Presentation

A Pilgrimage To The Modern Sky Temples of the American Southwest

Steve Pellarin recently journeyed to see some of the many observatories in this area. His original career interest was to become an Astronomer. Practical considerations led Steve to retain this interest as a keen amateur astronomer.

His trip started with some variations such as a visit to a decommissioned Russian submarine and a nuclear missile site.

Mount Palomar's 200 inch telescope saw Steve wandering in awe inside the dome admiring the huge equipment needed to point and track this enormous old telescope. A wide variety of telescopes of all sizes and types attracted Steve's attention at a number of mountain top observatories.

Steve was often able to gain admission otherwise restricted to employees and researches at some facilities. He was well received at all and at one, invited to spend a night in the control area watching observers monitoring computer screens as they gathered astronomical data for future reduction.

By happy coincidence he met Wayne Barkhouse a Ph.D. from the University of Toronto and now an important name in American Astronomy.

Photographs of all facilities were displayed by Steve along with very impressive examples astronomical photographs shot from many observatories.

Members showed their appreciation for Steve's enthusiastic presentation and the meeting was adjourned at 10:18 p.m.

It was moved by Gary Boyle, and seconded by Ted Bronson, that the annual membership fees of the Society be changed as follows:

Ordinary members

Increased from \$55 to \$59 with the Society portion equal to \$37 and the Centre portion equal to \$22;

Youth members

Increased from \$34.25 to \$36.75 with the Society portion equal to \$23.05 and the Centre portion equal to \$13.70.

The new fees shall become effective at a date determined by the Council, except no earlier than January 1, 2007. These fees are to be interpreted as Canadian dollars for members with addresses in Canada or as US dollars for members with addresses outside of Canada.

MOTION AM0606

It was moved by Denis Grey, and seconded by Joe Otonicar, that Bylaw 4.08(1) be amended to the following:

Every Centre is entitled to be represented on the National Council by one member of the Centre for each two hundred voting members of the Centre or portion thereof, which representatives are known as "National Council Representatives."

The number of National Council Representatives to which a Centre is entitled during a year shall be determined from the highest number of members of the Centre as of the end of any calendar month during the previous year, according to the membership records of the Society. A new Centre shall be entitled to one National Council Representative for the year in which it becomes a Centre.
