Monthly Meeting Minutes March 15, 2016

The monthly meeting of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada - Windsor Centre was held at the Ojibway Park Nature Centre.

Windsor Centre **President Randy Groundwater** chaired the meeting. Randy called the meeting to order at 7:45 p.m. and welcomed members and guests to the Ojibway Nature Centre.

Motion to accept the minutes of the February 16, 2016 meeting was made by Dr. Susan Sawyer-Beaulieu, seconded by Brian Simpson. MOTION CAR-RIED.

Main Presentation

Randy Groundwater gave a brief overview of the night's agenda and welcomed **Elizabeth Ismail** to the floor to discuss her presentation entitled "*The Death of the Universe*". Elizabeth started off with a short video with the same title. Following the video Juliana Grigorescu discussed a possible second theory to the "heat death", called "big rip", where-as the universe will keep expanding, and eventually expanding faster than the matter can expand. A quick recap of the Einstein's theories predicted this, some factors that must be taken into consideration are the Universe's shape and its components, along with **Matter, Dark Mater** and **Dark Energy**. Dark energy makes up more than 68% of all matter in the universe. It has some unique qualities, as the volume of space increases, Dark Energy increases to maintain a constant energy density. It is also accelerating the expansion of our universe and tearing it apart.

Following Elizabeth's talk Randy showed a brief 11 minute video produced by the RASC - London Centre which covered the **RASC General Assembly** and **AstroCATS** trade forum for 2016 which will be taking place in London, Ontatio.

Tom Sobocan was welcomed to the floor to present a retrospective slideshow of Centre events over the past year.

Dr. Susan Sawyer-Beaulieu gave a briefing on the Starry Night Wine Tasting Event at Colchester Ridge Estate Winery (CREW) being held on May 28th. Director of Observing Report

Randy welcomed **Steve Mastellotto** to the floor, to present the D of O Report. Steve started off with a general questions to the group on their observing activities within the last month. Steve specifically asked about:

- 1. The 5 Planets in the morning sky
- 2. Solar activity including the total solar eclipse and aurora
- 3. Jupiter double shadow transit

Steve showed some photos from group members, including Dan Taylor's photo morning planet line-up taken from his back yard.

Upcoming events to take into consideration include:

- Spring Equinox on Sunday March 20th at 12:30 a.m.
- Jupiter observing season
- Moon occults Aldebaran on Sunday April 10th from 6:35-7:45 p.m.
- Open house at Hallam on Saturday April 16 at 8:30 p.m.
- Mars and Saturn are in Ophiuchus and rise around 1:00 a.m.
- Mercury will be in the evening sky just after the Sunset in mid-April

Towards the end of March you can still see some of the winter constellations. The spring constellations are all rising with Jupiter being a bright point near Leo. This is Jupiter observing season, most common things to look for when visually observing, are the north and south equatorial belts, and if lucky on a clear night, the Great Red Spot will be visible. Steve also discussed some of the more difficult features to observe like white spots or ovals, festoons and barges in the belts. On March 22, look for both Europa and Io casting their shadows on Jupiter's disk at the time.

Focusing on the constellation of Cancer, some naked eye, binocular and telescopic deep sky targets include M44 the Beehive Cluster, M67 Open Cluster, and NGC 2903 Galaxy.

Randy thanked everyone for coming out to the meeting and reminded everyone that the **next regular membership meeting** would take place **Tuesday**, April 19th, 2016 at 7:30 p.m..

Randy adjourned the meeting at 10:05 p.m..
